H1: Europe blooms and celebrates scattered orchards internationally

Press conference on the 2nd European Orchard Day on 29 April 2022

H2: Orchards are everywhere: Whole Europe celebrates biodiversity

Whole Europe celebrates on this Friday, the 29th of April the Orchard Day. In the run-up to the event, orchard associations announced the day of participation and experience at a joint press conference. Together they invite to numerous actions and celebrate the biodiversity of the valuable habitat and the engagement of the orchardists.

"Similar to the Eurovision Song Contest - just with scattered orchards", Hannes Bürckmann from the association Hochstamm Deutschland e.V. rejoiced. He thus welcomed the guests from seven European countries at the online press conference to kick off the European Day of the Orchards this Friday. This day of action is being launched by an international group of organizers - ARGE Streuobst from Austria, UK Orchard Network from Great Britain, BirdLife International in Brussels and Hochstamm Deutschland e.V. - to draw attention to the scattered orchards.

At the beginning of the press conference, hardworking cultivators of orchards showed that the preservation of the landscape-shaping orchards is an international concern: They sent their greetings from Ireland, France, Poland, Slovenia and Italy. All of them emphasized how essential the preservation of orchards is for the conservation of biodiversity.

"Flowering orchard trees are like paradise on earth. The Day of the Orchard is like Mother's Day for biodiversity and Father's Day for our habitat and our cultural landscape! It is the strongest statement for sustainability and aims to raise awareness for products made from scattered orchards", Johann Hartl pointed out, one of the inventors of the action day. ARGE Streuobst is currently working - following the German model - on an application for the recognition of scattered orchards as an intangible cultural heritage in Austria. "In this way, we draw attention to the centuries-old tradition and contribute to the preservation of knowledge, traditions and influence on our society," stated the chairman of ARGE Streuobst Austria.

Adam Cade from the UK Orchard Network is convinced: "Orchards offer exciting experiences - there's something for everyone." At the moment, the UK is celebrating orchard blossoms as part of Blossom Day. The national campaign excites with picnics, hands-on crafts and produce markets. "Scattered orchards offers special products with recipes that are centuries old, such as cider or perry" described Cade the culinary pleasure from orchards. His organization, along with European partners, recently created a "toolbox" for teaching about traditional orchards.

Raphael Weyland member of BirdLife International, a network of national nature conservation NGOs, also referred to the current discussion on the intensification of agriculture at EU level: "This debate ignores the fact that the major planetary crises pose a major threat to our food security. We must therefore finally take action against the natural crisis. Natural, high-stem orchards are a good example of how to reconcile nature conservation and land use. The new Common Agricultural Policy of the EU offers Member States the possibility of setting up special ecological regulations to promote orchards, said the lawyer specializing in environmental law, and added: "Citizens have to learn to value good regional food".

Martina Hörmann, chairwoman of Hochstamm Deutschland e.V., focused on the preservation of the diverse flora and fauna, but also of the culture related to the traditional orchards in her greeting: "The overarching goal of Hochstamm Deutschland e.V. is preservation through utilization. We consider the Orchard Day as an instrument in order to make consumers more aware of 100%-orchard products and to encourage them to buy these products". She is also pleased that the ARGE Streuobst Austria, following the example of Hochstamm Deutschland e.V. in listing orchards as an intangible cultural heritage. "Our goal is to create the international registry at the UNESCO together with other European states. To achieve this, the Orchard Day and the various activities are an important element," the orchard expert is convinced.

European Orchard Day

Initiated in 2021 by ARGE Streuobst, the last Friday in April was declared as "Orchard Day". Since then, Hochstamm Deutschland e.V. has been responsible for promoting and coordinating the Action Day. Active support is provided by ARGE Streuobst from Austria, BirdLife Europe and the UK Orchard Network from Great Britain. Under the slogan #orchardseverywhere scattered orchard cultivators inspire with various actions all over Europe. On a common homepage interested people find the suitable event.
